


Award-winning performance artist/writer Denise Uyehara will read and perform excerpts from her new work-in-progress, Bic FHAD. Bid, HAD links the memory of the World War II internment of Japanese Americans with the present-day mistreatment of those suspected of being "the enemy." This interdisciplinary piece is inspired by letters her great uncle composed in 1942 on his twentleb birthday while incarcerated at Rohwer Relocation Center in Arkansas, and takes a look at the violation of individual civil liberties in recent times. A non-linear montage of image, monologue and mowement, "Big Head" evokes the mysteriously winding path of collective memory, and how individuals interpret their past to provide hope for the future. Uyehara conceived this performance before September 11 of last year, but has only now been able to develop it more fully." I began to look at my personal responsibility that comes with legacy, seasys, "I saked myself how could I apply something that happened to my relatives over half a decade ago to my world today, and where do I stand? This is my response."

hiding." Performer Lida Abdullah's concern for the continuing
dispossession and lack of media coverage of refugees world
wide is rooted in her personal experience fleeing her homeland
of Afghanistan, mowing to India, Germany and finally the
United States. Through KABUL, she hopes to resurrect the
ghosts who have followed her over the years, those who have
left their indelible messages in her mind. "Once you have lived
as a refugee," Abdullah says, "Once you have lost afmly, home
and even language, you are always ready- you are careful in
what you love, knowing that, yes, it can happen again."


