I walked into the theater with my producer's analytical brain completely in command, but by evening's end my brain had surrendered to my heart. This play, which explores the fragility of love and the eternal wounds that come from loss, affected me greatly. Like the rib cage which protects the heart, A Language of Their Own possesses a muscularity of language and a command of storytelling which allows the vulnerability and deep humanity of the characters to fully explode. This play, along with Porcelain, as effective as they are, are but the early steps of an exciting artist's journey.
